


The Ripple Maker

“Ripplemaker” Mike Knighton retires

The reports through the years have been glowing. Reed Finlay '58 in “Successus Fidelitate: Christ School in the 1970s, 80s, and 90s” said “Mike Knighton was the man every parent would want his son to have as a mentor and friend.” When the Class of 2006 announced that it was dedicating its yearbook to him, “the entire school erupted in a standing ovation.” Testimonials abound that “Coach” has made a difference in the lives of the boys passing through the halls of Christ School.

Mike’s profound impact and his legacy to Christ School come from qualities too often given short shrift in the curriculum vitae of modern life. He has warmth. He has humor. He has a generous heart. He is a great (nay, “infamous”) storyteller. He is dedicated and passionate in his chosen service. He has an ability to articulate lasting values in a way that inspire the mind and heart. And most of all, when he meets you in the hallway, he makes you feel that, of all the people in the world he could have happened upon, he is most glad that it was you.


Mike joined Christ School in 1981 after serving as Assistant Headmaster at LaGrange Academy. During his tenure, he served as Varsity Football Coach, Dean of Students, Director of Admissions, Athletic Director, English teacher and Director of Alumni Relations. He is a Georgia native and he played football and majored in English (not necessarily in that order) at Vanderbilt University. He earned a Master of Arts in Education at West Georgia College. Mike’s family has also been part of the Christ School community. His wife, Shirley, worked at the Jigger Shop and his children, Matt '87 and Elizabeth grew up on the school campus. Matt is currently the school’s Director of Grounds and the artist who has created stone walkways, benches and flower beds.



Mike’s own words capture his extraordinary spirit:

“For me, however, what transcends the emotion of winning and losing is that spirit of competition that prevails between these two great institutions [Christ School and Asheville School] and how that competition has helped to shape the character of so many young men throughout the years. For a coach, the final score doesn’t read so many points for my team, so many points for theirs. Instead, it reads: so many men out of so many boys. And

this is a score that is never published. And this is the score he reads to himself and in which he finds his real joy when the last game is over.”



We all know of Mike’s fondness for motivational words such as the “Thoroughbred,” Teddy Roosevelt’s inspiring lines “It is not the critic who counts, not the man who points out how it could have been done...” and more. In Mike’s office is an autographed picture of Super Bowl MVP Brad Johnson saying “To Mike Knighton, the Thoroughbred.”

All of these quotes are related to the importance of positive attitudes in life, especially not quitting, or more precisely of having character, one of the most important traits that any young man can have.




1937



Captain Frank L. Hudnor III '57

Captain Frank Hudnor III '57, of Mocksville, passed away May 27, 2008. At Christ School Frank was a star athlete who played under Coach Richard "Fessor" Fayssoux. He was inducted into the Christ School Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998 and later served on the nominating committee. Frank served as a member of the Christ School Board of Trustees from 2001-2006, was a Strategic Planning Chair, and a Class Agent.

Captain Hudnor graduated from Wake Forest University and entered the U.S. Navy School of Preflight at Pensacola, Fla., as an Aviation Officer Candidate. He was designated a naval aviator in October 1964. He began his operational flying in the P2V7 aircraft and qualified as a patrol plane commander. After an illustrious and varied career in the Navy, Captain Hudnor assumed command of the U.S. Naval Air Station, Sigonella, Sicily in 1986. After this tour, Captain Hudnor was reassigned to Norfolk as the Commanding Officer, ASW Training Group Atlantic. In September 1990, Captain Hudnor became Commanding Officer, U.S. Naval Station Panama Canal.



The Rev. R. Lansing Hicks, Ph.D. '38

Christ School alumnus, R. Lansing Hicks '38, professor emeritus of Old Testament and former dean of academic affairs at Yale Divinity School, died on January 14, 2008, in Hamden, Connecticut after a long illness. Hicks, an ordained Episcopal priest, had served as a professor at Yale for 19 years and, before that, at Berkeley Divinity School for 13 years. Hicks was remembered by his colleagues at Yale as "a teacher who cared deeply about his students both in and out of class" and as a man of the greatest integrity. In his early career he was one of a group of faculty that resigned their positions at The University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee in 1953 to protest the school's failure to desegregate.

Professor Hicks attended Christ School for five years. He was manager for the '37 football team, played baseball and soccer, served as Acolyte and head of his cottage and was a member of the Monogram Club. The June 1938 *Warrior* described him as follows: "He always has some

bright remark for every occasion, and it always brings a laugh. He is well liked by everyone, and he's one of the best in any 'bull session.' Hicks is planning to take up the ministry for his life work, and he will surely succeed; so best wishes and good luck, Hicks." In the Will for the 1938 Senior Class, Lansing Hicks left his uncanny dancing ability to "Truckin'" Earl Jackson and half of his wit to "Dazed" Richardson.

Hicks earned his B.A in 1942 from Wake Forest, where he was Phi Beta Kappa, and his B.D. from the University of the South in 1945.

From a news release by Yale Divinity School... "at times, Hicks was the only member of the YDS faculty with enough archeological field experience to teach an Old Testament archeology course. In 1976 he was visiting archeologist for excavations at Tell Dan, and in summer 1966 he was field supervisor in the excavations at et-Tell."

After her marriage at nineteen to Ernest Lee "Bill" Sewell, Jr. '57, Helen moved to Christ School, just months older than the seniors. Over the next 17 years while Bill coached football and taught, Helen became like a "second mom" for many of the young boys away from home.

She remained a supporter of the school and served on the Christ School Board of Trustees from 1999 to 2001, even after her move to Raleigh where she began her career working as the jury supervisor in the Wake County Courthouse. Upon her retirement after 25 years, Helen was awarded the Order of the Long Leaf Pine from Gov. Mike Easley in recognition of her outstanding service to the state of North Carolina. Helen was an active and faithful member of Christ Episcopal Church where she served as a volunteer in the office and greatly enjoyed working as a wedding director for many years.

She is survived by three sons, Bill Sewell '80 and wife, Martha, Scott Sewell and wife, Mary-Beth, George Sewell '93 and wife, Meredith, all of Raleigh; four grandchildren, Lee Sewell, Hannah Sewell, Ward Sewell and Stone Sewell.

A memorial service in celebration and thanksgiving was held at St. Joseph's Chapel at Christ School with interment in the Harris Chapel columbarium.
